She also wrote the check that paid off the remaining balance on the purchase of land that is now the Elkhorn Creek Biodiversity Preserve.

According to Henrietta's wishes the Northwest Illinois Audubon Society has received a distribution from her estate with the request that this bequest be put in our endowment fund. Our distribution amounted to \$19,418.55. This means that our chapter can spend as the board sees fit any interest earned on this amount but cannot spend any of the actual bequest itself. A good thing about this type of plan is that we will have an additional source of income that will last in perpetuity.

## Toward a Cooler Planet

This is the eleventh in a series of articles looking at the many things that each of us can do to help with global warming. This eleventh article asks not so much for action, but for understanding.

## Birds and Climate Change

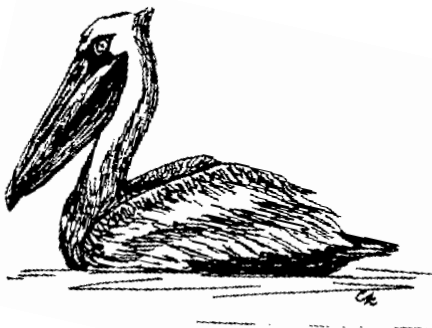
On February 10, 2009, the National Audubon Society released the results of an analysis of Christmas Bird Counts from 1968-2008. The findings reveal dramatic latitudinal shifts in many species. While the overall average northward shift was about 1 mile/year, many species shifted their winter ranges northward by over 300 miles during the analyzed period. This is compelling evidence that we need to work swiftly to halt global warming.

While climatic zones are shifting northward, protected animal habitats are fixed in place. Hence a given bird species may need to move north by a given amount to stay within its preferred temperature belt, but may find that suitable habitat is not available. If birds remain in their current winter habitat, they could find themselves competing with northward-shifting newcomers for food and nesting territories.

If we think about our own Elkhorn Creek Biodiversity Preserve, the "climate" it had when we purchased it is now on the Ogle-Stephenson county border. The climate it had in 1968 is now found in southern Wisconsin, as far as the average winter bird resident is concerned.

Therefore, it continues to be imperative that organizations concerned about bird conservation, like ours, be equally concerned about climate change solutions: energy conservation and alternative energy sources.

## Watt Meters are Here!

By the time you read these words, Kill-a-Watt meters with instructions for use should be in your local libraries. Check them out . . . literally. There are very easy to use.

Learn which of your appliances are costing you the most. Determine how much electricity some appliances use even when they are off. This amount is called the standby power or phantom load. This alone costs consumers some \$4 billion a year, at 10c/KwH. That is 40 billion KwHs causing some 60 billion pounds of carbon dioxide each year to enter the atmosphere.

It is often said that the truth will set us free. Visit your library, check out a meter, free us some cash and help cool the planet. It needs our help (see article on Birds and Climate Change on page ?).

Jo-Carroll Electric has placed meters in libraries in their service area and our chapter is providing meters for the other libraries in the area. If you learn something useful, write a letter to your newspaper and encourage others to use the meters!

## “Hope, Action and a Sense of Place”

This year's Upper Midwest Regional Audubon Conference, with the theme “Hope, Action and a Sense of Place,” will take place at Chestnut Mountain Resort near Galena on September 18-20. Auduboners from Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa will gather on this weekend not only to learn more about crucial issues and fascinating topics of natural history, but also to become inspired and re-dedicated to the important work that our chapters do. The conference is sponsored by the Audubon Council of Illinois.

Keynote presenters include outstanding nature photographer David Olson, noted author Scott Russell Sanders (who will also lead a writer's workshop), and grassland bird authority Dr. Jim Herkert. In addition, a luncheon address will be provided by National Audubon Society President John Flicker.

There are a variety of Saturday morning field trips to choose from which focus on birds, geology, natural history or wind energy. The many concurrent session options on Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning are included in the topic tracts of Bird Conservation, Restoration and Management, Connecting People with Nature, Protecting Our Water Resources, Energy and Climate Change, and Chapter Roundtables.

An early registration fee of only \$75 includes a Friday night reception, Saturday lunch and dinner, Sunday lunch, all sessions and keynotes, and most field trips. By registering early, participants not only will pay the reduced fee, but will have a better opportunity to obtain placement in their first choice field trip and the “Wild Imagination” writing workshop. Chestnut Mountain lodging rates are reduced as well if reservations are made early.

## Celebrating the Elkhorn Creek Biodiversity Preserve!

In May of 1999 our chapter, along with the Prairie Preservation Society of Ogle County, purchased the 43-acre Elkhorn Creek Biodiversity Preserve in Northwest Ogle County near Forreston. To commemorate our 10 years of connection, essays about the Preserve will be printed in the remaining newsletters of 2009. Below is the first of our series of reflections.

### IN HONOR OF ELKHORN...

Scott Russell Sanders, in his book “The Force of Spirit” speaks about the power of stories and describes how, before the Europeans, our continent was covered with names that were shorthand versions of stories – about the gifts of a place, about memorable events that happened there, about other creatures that lived there. Examples of names for a place, from a tribe in Alaska are, “Where a forest fire burned the hill to the river” or “High place where you look out at the land.”

As the Audubon community of friends celebrates ten years at the Elkhorn Biodiversity Preserve, Mr. Sanders’ words ring especially true. Each adopted plot of land at Elkhorn describes a unique ‘gift of place’. My adopted plot at Elkhorn, “Bluestem View” connects me to the first prairie plant I learned....Big Bluestem. My sister, years ago, earning a Master’s in Outdoor Education at Lowden, taught me to recognize this grass that grew wild on her rural, uncut roadside. Called ‘turkey toes’ for short, she took great pleasure in locating it each year and reminding me that it once covered the prairie and was tall enough to hide buffalo.

Elkhorn carries many other reminders about ‘gifts of place’ and memorable events. If we were to name those places today, as early tribes once did, we might call them:

- ⌘ “Place where friends look at stars”
- ⌘ “Place where Prairie Gentian covers hill”
- ⌘ “Big tree where you swing looking over the wetland”
- ⌘ “Place where goats eat Multi-Flora rose and woman reads”
- ⌘ “Place where spiders rule the land”

Elkhorn gives us a ‘vantage point’ to look out at the land, alone in reflection or in community, working hard toward a common purpose, preserving one spot that has the potential to nourish a spirit that often lies dormant in our hurried lives. I think Elkhorn is as much about ‘us’ as it is about the restoration and biology of the place. And the connection between those two is the real ‘gift of place.’

Footnote: That rural roadside where my sister and I waited to spot the Big Bluestem each year is now mowed several times each summer by the county, preventing the seed bed from realizing it’s potential.

### NIAS Co-sponsors Ag Talk on Positive Alternatives to CAFOs

NIAS has decided to co-sponsor of an event on April 18th with the H.O.M.E.S group. H.O.M.E.S. (Helping Others Maintain Environmental Standards) formed when the megadairy was proposed to be built in the Nora area. The megadairy, when built, is proposed to house 13,000 cows. The group has been fighting this from the beginning for environmental reasons. This group is now in a court battle with the owner of the dairy and there has been quite a bit of publicity, letters to papers, etc. in this neck of the woods.

John Jankowski of the H.O.M.E.S group felt that it was time for the group to start doing a more positive campaign for agriculture - they have been putting out lots of 'negative' information about CAFOs (concentrated

animal feeding operations) and feel it's time they start putting out some positive information. John was impressed with our balance of information at Food For Thought and realized that it's important to give some positive alternatives to the negatives.

H.O.M.E.S group has lined up 2-3 speakers from the Center For Rural Affairs (located in Nebraska) to come present information about alternative options to CAFO's. This is intended to be a 'positive' approach to the CAFO situation since H.O.M.E.S has pretty much covered all the negative effects of a CAFO in the area. The event is free and will be held at the Freeport Public Library and will last from 11:00-2:00 p.m.
